No More Stolen Strawberries or Dumpster Donuts

"If nobody ever teaches you how to swim, if you find yourself in the ocean, it's not going to matter how badly you don't want to drown. . . That was me in my life. That's every struggling alcoholic and addict who isn't given a chance at being taught what it is that's fueling their behavior." —Sarah

OR YEARS, Sarah survived on two things: stolen strawberries from a farm near the bridge she lived under and donuts from a bakery dumpster.

"You could jump in the donut dumpster, and you'd have to get in and out before the trash compactor smashed you to death," she says.

The Pull of Addiction

At the time, Sarah thought risking death just to get something to eat was the best option. That's how far down addiction had dragged this intelligent young woman who had gone to college and had a bright future ahead of her.

"My brother shared the same struggle. His addiction took over faster, caused more wreckage and got more attention, so for a very long time I was able to elude any suspicion of my own secret using," Sarah says.

Like so many young people, Sarah's addiction began with opioids – prescription pills. But after a while, they weren't enough, so she began using heroin. There was no way to hide anymore.

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"Over the early months of my heroin use, I lost my career and was never able to hold any job to follow. I lost my home, the car, my family. Everything. My brother and I both were put into multiple rehabs and given every opportunity to escape the hell we created."

Even after her brother died of an overdose, Sarah's addiction told her she didn't need to escape.

"My consequence ended up saving my life."

"I told my mom I would kill myself before I'd go to prison," she says. "It meant that I wouldn't be able to do drugs at my leisure."

Eventually, Sarah's addiction and the crimes that helped to fuel it caught up with her, and she was arrested. While behind bars, she found out about our 12-Month Residential Recovery Program and applied. When she was released, she came straight to our door.

"I arrived there three months clean and sober, scared out of my mind, and literally without anything, even shoes," Sarah says. "The twelve months that followed were the best, most educational, influential, and enriching months of my life."

Amazing Grace

The #1 reason that time was so good: Sarah met Jesus.

"My long overdue reunion with Him was just the beginning," she says. "God kept showering me with gifts during my time at the Mission. Through art therapy, yoga, time to hike or enjoy the beach, process groups, individual counseling, and especially, mandated involvement in twelve step fellowship and church, He unearthed the darkest parts of what had always been so sick in my soul. I grew up in my year there . . . I finally healed."

Today Sarah is a new person. She's been sober for over 3 years, volunteers weekly at the Mission, and manages a sober living house here in Santa Barbara.

"The words to "Amazing Grace" ring so very true for me, because I was in fact lost, but am now found, my chains of addiction are forever gone. Thank you so much for making it possible for me to be set free!"


He is so good that He showers grace upon us again and again and again. And he'll never run out. Ever.

Announcing Our New Resource Center

During the pandemic, with libraries closed, many of our homeless guests had nowhere to access computers. That meant they couldn't apply for replacement IDs, search for jobs, work on their resumes, apply for housing, get social security cards, and more.

So, seeing the need, we decided to create and open a Resource Center.

"Guests have felt stuck, and the Resource Center offers hope to move forward in life. It's a space to focus on the future. It gives staff time to sit down and have one-on-one conversations with the guests so they can ask for specific help," says Jeri, Operations Assistant for Homeless Guest Services.

The Resource Center is held in the chapel every Thursday afternoon, giving men and women not only access to computers, but a time to sit down with staff one-on-one to create a personalized plan for escaping homelessness. Each week there are new guests and guests who are coming back to work on their exit plans.

This new center wouldn't have been possible without the support of people like you!

The Resource Center is held in the Chapel every Thursday from 12 - 3 PM. Here guests can use computers to:

- Get their social security cards
- Apply for housing
- Obtain birth certificates
- Get their identification cards
- Create resumes
- Apply for jobs
- Check their emails (most do not have smartphones) And more!


Leaving a Legacy of Love

The Mission's library was recently dedicated to an incredible couple, John and Patty Watts. Patty worked here for 12 years, and John served as our volunteer consultant dedicated to planned giving.

"I came to the Rescue Mission with Rolf's predecessor, thinking I would just stay there for a few weeks or a couple of months at the most to help him get organized and feeling comfortable. And because I fell in love with the work, I ended up staying on the whole time he was there. Then when Rolf came was when I thought I would leave, and they asked me if I'd stay a couple months with Rolf and I ended up staying another several years," Patty says.

"Because of working at the Mission, I fell in love with the work there. And so obviously we wanted to remember the Mission in our will," she says.

Together John and Patty wrote *Memo to: My Loved Ones,* a book that they used to plan their legacy.



"We filled it out for our family, and thought we would just give it to other people and say, 'This is what's really important. So when you're gone, your family doesn't wonder what you wanted to do with what money you had.""

And today, Patty wants to give the book – and another one that John wrote, *Leave Your House in Order* – to you.
